From the Rabbi's Study... As The Year Turns

Can it be that we have arrived again at the month of Elul (don't I say that every year?) inviting us to

take a steady, if fast-paced walk into the Days of Awe? I am so delighted to be welcoming Cantor Juval Porat back to BCC, this time as BCC's cantor. And pleased also to be sharing the bimah during the Days of Awe and throughout this year with our new student rabbi, Lindy Davidson. Most of us already know Juval a little bit anyway, enough to be thrilled that he is joining us. And every time I mention Lindy to people from HUC, their faces light up - "You're going to love her!" "Oh, she'll be such a good fit for BCC." "Lucky you!" Join me in welcoming Lindy and her family to BCC.

By the time you read this Juval, Lindy and I will be well underway in our preparations for the Days of Awe. As always we couldn't do it without Victoria, Felicia, Tim and various super volunteers paving the way for us, making our annual trek easier as we make our way from BCC to Temple Isaiah – our synagogue home away from home

 and as we join together in full community to see the turning of another year.

From the beginning of Elul (this year it began on the evening of August 20) through the end of Yom Kippur, Jewish tradition offers us a forty-day period set aside for each of us to examine our life in depth, to consider with great care how we are living. It's a time to start making changes if we need to. For some people it is an opportunity not just to change one's life, but to get a life...a time to discover, for example, that making a living is not necessarily the same thing as making a life. Perhaps an especially important thought here in this still unpredictable economy.

What a gift we Jews give ourselves, forty days every year set aside to talk to ourselves and then to talk to others — to talk about what we have done well and what we have done poorly, to talk about how we have acted ethically and how we have violated our own code of ethics, and God's. A time to ask forgiveness and where possible, to grant forgiveness. Forty days set aside to reflect and repent, to acknowledge to ourselves and others what we have done, to try to correct the mistakes we have made, to resolve not to make them again, to take steps not to make them again.

In the midst of these weeks of self-

reflection and self-repair, we also find ourselves in the midst of Torah portions that summon us to action for the greater good. Tzedek, tzedek tirdof – justice, justice you shall pursue. Instructions about governance and judgment, about war and how to fight it, about treatment of those in need (see Torah portions in the middle of Deuteronomy such as Re'eh and Shoftim). Lest we think that tshuvah is a selfish act, we are reminded that our pursuit of justice and our partnership in the care of the world is also part of God's intention for us, part of what we need to be examining at this time of year.

When BCC was picketed in June by members of Fred Phelps's Westboro Baptist Church (Godhatesfags.com) in June, a number of our neighbors let them know they were not welcome. It was a good reminder to us that we live in harmony with our neighbors on Pico and Stearns. But it also made me realize we hardly know most of those neighbors. Through a fortunate coming together of circumstances, though, we'll soon be reaching out and getting more involved. Our work and planning for

our new building at 6090 W. Pico continues with invaluable participation from members of our congregation, most especially Ira Dankberg, who has spent countless hours during the last few months overseeing the long and complicated process of evaluating the building and obtaining the proper permits from the city. Among the requirements is making certain the neighbors around 6090 will be glad for our presence in the neighborhood. Hand-in-hand with that outreach to neighbors comes BCC's increasing involvement with One LA, a citywide neighborhood advocacy and social change organization. As we create a new synagogue home for ourselves, we're also working to create a better neighborhood (and world).

May this month of Elul and the Days of Awe that follow be a time of tshuvah, of "turning" for us all: may we turn toward one another and toward God, may we each turn into the person we want to be, may we turn the teachings of a Book into the living of a life.

President's Message

A Few Words from Bruce...

It is with great honor that I address you for the first time as President of Beth Chayim Chadashim.

When I began serving on the Board of BCC in February 2006, I was impressed with the quality of our Congregation's leadership, but just as important was how much each of them truly cared about and loved this community. But that love does not end with those serving on the Board or in any other leadership position. The members of BCC have built a truly loving and wonderful community that will soon begin its 38th year!

BCC is not just another Congregation. BCC is a very special place, founded by special people with a

vision that continues to shape how we will succeed in the years ahead. In a time when being publicly "out" often meant risking one's career, one's family and one's friends, the founders of BCC were a courageous group of gay and lesbian Jews who decided to hold a Friday night service in one of their homes. Their original idea was simply to provide a safe and comforting place for Jewish gays and lesbians to worship together. Certainly no other synagogue, Reform, Conservative or otherwise would dare to openly welcome gays and lesbians into their Congregation, let alone to provide a safe place for them to meet one another, pray together, socialize and organize.

We've come a long way since those days, but I hold firmly to the belief that BCC exists to fulfill this same need today. Sure, many other Congregations have opened their doors to G's B's L's T's and even Q's....but here we are a community. We respect each other, we pray, learn, study, socialize, celebrate, mourn and laugh together. Hey, we are even building together. Our commitment to each other is so strong that we've outgrown our home of the past 31 years, and are soon to be the owners of a new and bigger home for our Congregation.

Several people have asked me what my vision for BCC might be. Well, I can probably best answer that your vision is my vision. When Brett became President in 2005, he met with a large number of you one-on-one and asked some very pointed questions. Each of you responded with what you wanted BCC to look like in both the near and long-term. Now I realize we've brought in many new members since 2005, and I hope to attract and bring in many new members

Transitions Group (page 13), and our tradition of recognizing the milestones and accomplishments of our congregants in our "mazel tov" column (page 14). And our Executive Director Felicia Park-Rogers helps us keep track of it all with her column on the many ways we can stay connected with BCC (page 12).

And we'll soon be preparing our new building so we'll have more space in which to do it all. There's something for everyone here, so read, enjoy, and get involved!

each year in the future as well.

I would also propose to meet with as many of you as I can, to hear directly from you what you see as BCC's vision. Where do you want us to be in two years? ...in five years? ...in ten years? What are we doing right? What can we do better? I will take a proactive approach and begin to reach out to many of you myself, but please if you would like to meet me sooner, I encourage you to contact me and let's set a time to get together and talk.

In these last years a number of changes have taken place. None of these could have occurred successfully if it were not for the decision to bring on an Executive Director. Starting from her first day Felicia has added a level of professionalism to everything we do. Our events, our fundraising, our membership, our publications, our public relations, our outreach, our education, our lay leadership and even our clergy all operate so much more efficiently with Felicia around. Felicia also leads a very dedicated group of BCC staff who work very hard to ensure that our operations flow smoothly: Victoria Delgadillo, who is entering her 13th year as our Office Manager, Leah Zimmerman, our Education Director, Ralph Cataldo, our bookkeeper, and Tim Goad, our custodian.

In addition, we've started and completed the single most successful Capital Campaign drive for a small Congregation that our fundraising consultant Mark Randall had ever witnessed. This Congregation raised pledge commitments of \$3.2 Million Dollars. That's almost twice what he or anyone expected we'd raise. We've shopped and entered into escrow on a building. In the next few months, we will close escrow and begin construction on our new building. Soon, we'll refer to 6090 (as opposed to 6000) West Pico as our new home.

We've reformulated and modernized our Membership Contribution policies and procedures. We've started a religious school for our youngsters.

We've started our Ruach Chayim service, reinforcing our tradition of rich and original music here at BCC.

We have formalized our outreach to the younger community, through our 20's & 30's Havurah.

We have said good-bye to our long-time Cantorial Soloist, Fran

Chalin, and hello to our new Cantor Juval Porat.

We have had a couple of extremely

talented and gifted Student Rabbis grace us with their presence and knowledge. In particular, I would like to thank Rabbi Joe Hample, for over the past two years serving as our Student Rabbi, for giving to BCC so much more than he can ever imagine. And I'd like to welcome our new Student Rabbi for 5770, Lindy Davidson.

And we are truly blessed to have Rabbi Lisa Edwards these past 15 years. One tangible benefit of taking on a leadership role at BCC is getting to know Rabbi Lisa even better. Having Rabbi Lisa Edwards available to each of us is worth the cost of your membership contribution. If you have not had the opportunity to get to know Lisa better, make it your goal to do so this year.

I would like to briefly thank a few people for their service and commitment to BCC. We have several departing Board members; when you see them please join me in thanking Aaron Tornell, Davi Cheng, Avram Chill and Erik Hyman for their dedicated service to BCC. Additionally, I am pleased to announce that Robin Berkovitz, David Mozes, Jerry Nodiff, Cecilia Quigley Groman, Hannah Theile and Maggie Parkhurst will each continue

to serve on our Board. And I'd like to take this opportunity to welcome the following new members to our Board of Directors: Eric Kamm, Kadin Henningsen and Julie Gertler. Each of our Board members is open to hearing from you, our members.

I have also had the privilege of working with an amazing group of officers. Our Executive Committee has included Dr. Allison Diamant, The Honorable Judge Donna Groman, and Dr. Brett Trueman. With the

Our New Student Rabbi Lindy Davidson



Hi. My name is Lindy Reznick Davidson and I'm excited to become a new part of the BCC

community as a rabbinic intern/student rabbi in 5770.

From a very young age my mother taught me the power of stories and storytelling. Together she and I would pass time by making up stories as we walked, waited or cuddled together. Understanding each other's stories can only help us to better connect to one another. As far back as I can remember I had a passion for the arts, drama and dance. I have always used this passion to reach others, educate, and inspire. Following my passion for the arts I studied Theater and Dance for my Bachelor of Arts at the University of California at Santa Cruz. My love of languages, beginning with Spanish, has led me to travel all over the world. I have lived in South America and Israel. and have visited Jewish communities in Egypt, Spain, Italy, Prague, the former Soviet Union, Greece and Turkey, to name a few.

After pursuing my undergraduate degree I decided to move to Israel and explore my Jewish roots up close and personal. I lived in Israel for two years following college, where I worked for Hillel doing outreach for Jewish students. In addition I studied and lived in a variety of cities in Israel while on Project Otzma working with Israelis of all ages from different parts of the country. I came home for a summer expecting to return to Israel the

following fall, only to meet my husband in Santa Monica.
Engagement, marriage and graduate school delayed our return to Israel for a few years after that. While stateside I continued pursuing my three loves, art, education and Judaism. I was a Jewish educator for a number of years, taking on a combination of jobs that spanned my fields of interest.

My husband Matt shares my passion for the arts and Judaism as both a musician and composer and as Program Director at Kehillat Israel Reconstructionist Congregation in Pacific Palisades. He has also won a number of distinguished awards for his Jewish music. Our daughter Clara, who is two-and-a-half, already loves music, as one can observe when she rocks out at Shabbat services. She has been hearing wonderful music since she was in the womb.

After a few years I knew it was time to continue to learn and grow, and I decided to pursue a dual masters degree. Lattended HUC-JIR for a Masters in Jewish communal service, paired with a Master of Public Art Studies from USC. I received a fellowship to take my "public art" work to the Jewish community. Juval Porat

As we have previously reported, Cantor Juval Porat returns to us for High Holy Days this year, and will grace our bimah for Friday night services throughout the year as well. Juval was ordained this June by the Abraham Geiger College in Berlin, the first liberal Jewish seminary in Continental Europe since the Shoah, and is the first cantor invested in Germany since before World War II. Juval will also lead the monthly

Ruach Chayim musical service that we have come to enjoy so much these past few years. Here are a few of Juval's thoughts on joining the BCC community.

So here I am. As I write these lines, it has been about three and a half weeks since I got on a plane from Berlin to Los Angeles to begin what I consider to be a new chapter in my life. Everything is still very new to me: the music, the people, the landscape, the weather, the architecture...I could go on and on.

Many of you have asked if the move has been difficult for me. I'd be lying if I said that it's easy. But, getting used to everything is quite an experience and I'm happy to be going through it. Fortunately, friends, family and loved ones have helped to make the adjustment process easier.

For a very long time, and especially during my cantorial studies over the last four and a half years, I have been soothed, touched and comforted by music. It doesn't matter which style or which instrument; music for me has always had the power to reach my inner self, to change my breath, my energy and even my perspective. With the help of the beautiful choir as well as other BCC members, I'll do my best to offer the congregation music that will enable self-reflection and transformation, and that will strengthen BCC in its prayers and as a community. I look forward to experiencing this new chapter in my life with all of you.

We are reminded of - and find ourselves dealing with - our fragility, our vulnerability, our power to create, destroy, accept and forgive in every moment of our lives.

Selichot, our entry into the Days of Awe

Our preparation for the Days of Awe continues with a spiritual evening of reflection, music and prayer on Saturday evening, September 12 from 10 pm until midnight, at BCC. Get acquainted with Cantor Porat and our new student rabbi, Lindy Davidson, as they join Rabbi Edwards for a contemplative evening bidding farewell to the last Shabbat of the year 5769. Light refreshments will be available.

Once a month I carry my box of percussion instruments, a boom box and CD's, and a Torah to the Country Villa Wilshire Convalescent Home at 855 N. Fairfax. I do this in order to bring a Shabbat feeling to the Jewish and non-Jewish residents of this facility. This project has been a tradition of BCC for over 25 years. A small group of BCC members have found joy in the mitzvah of visiting the residents one Shabbat each month.

Beginning with a very upbeat version of Shalom Aleichem, the tambourines, maracas, bells, and sticks are passed out. Residents, who very seldom speak, welcome the instruments into their hands and keep to the beat of the music as we thank God for this wonderful day.

Hallelujah is a word that is said in many religions. We all sing Hallelujah together with the music of Debbie

Friedman and the little social hall of the facility becomes a holy place. I look into the eyes of residents and see a sparkle of life. In their eyes I see the connection to God and great appreciation for this time that we share.

I feel blessed to carry on this BCC tradition. You are welcome to join us the second Saturday of each month (though in September we meet on September 26—change of dates happen from time to time so check the calendar and weekly email). No Hebrew necessary (but knowing Russian is a plus). The musical Shabbat gathering is from 11:00 am until about 11:45. You are welcome to come earlier or stay after to visit with residents. Come join us once and experience why we continue this mitzvah.

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Update: One LA at BCC

BCC is well on its way to becoming an active congregation with One LA. For those who don't yet know, One LA is part of a national organization called the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF), which brings together churches, synagogues, unions, schools, and non-profits to work on social problems at their roots.

On August 23, we had our first strategy session at the home of Rabbi Lisa and Tracy, led by our One LA organizer, rabbinic student Elan Babchuck. Elan is leaving Los Angeles to resume his rabbinic studies in Israel in late August. Robert Hoo, another competent One LA organizer

who will continue the work with BCC, was able to join us as well. Other participants included Eric Kamm, Julie Gertler, Dominique Bender, Rabbi Joe Hample, and myself.

To date Rabbi Lisa and I have been to two "actions" or assemblies together. Gavi Ruit, Avram Chill, and Murray Aronson have each joined us

for one of these assemblies. For me, the most powerful one was on July 12 at Wilshire Boulevard Temple, where about 750 people gathered to hear proposals from One LA including one on mortgage foreclosures. L.A. city council members Wendy Greuel, Jose Huizar, and Bernard Parks, plus

Ramon Cortines, Superintendent of LAUSD, committed to supporting these proposals.

We have had three house meetings at the homes of David Mozes and Peter Bastien, Barbara Kroll and Ruth Spielman, and my own. Some 30 BCCers participated in one or more of these meetings. We shared the concerns that are troubling us in these difficult times: unemployment, health care, mortgage foreclosure, a crosswalk in front of BCC, hunger, and the

need for political reform in California. The gatherings underscored the precarious edge to our lives, our loved ones, and people we know.

California is the world's eighth largest economy, and yet we are a social/economic basket case. Some 40% of the nation's mortgage foreclosures are here in our state. The recent special mass offering of free medical care in Inglewood pointed up the desperate need for health care many people face. The new state budget will have grave cuts affecting the lives of our state's most vulnerable people: the poor, elderly, ill, and those with HIV.

In keeping with the introspective spirit of the High Holy Days we will offer a conversation during the Yom Kippur break. The Days of Awe offer us time to look at our relationships, our hopes and frustrations, and our visions. What qualities or strengths do we want for this New Year? Is empowerment among them? 


Sunday, October 4, at 10:00 a.m.,

What's up with the Pushkes?

The BCC Tzedakah Council is retiring the current version of the BCC pushke. You know the one — cute little purple number with a high probability the lid will fall out at the most inconvenient moment, scattering coins all over the floor. Messy business.

Our little cutie of a pushke is vintage 1998. It has served our community well, functioning as the conduit for transporting the equivalent of 2,634,632 pennies or \$26,346.32 in spare change from our homes to BCC to be distributed to an array of charities worldwide. From the beginning 100% of all our collective tzedakah coin donations have been distributed to programs that reach out to people, often when they are experiencing considerable vulnerability. So far the Tzedakah Council has made donations on behalf of the BCC community to 77 organizations.

We have given to disaster relief aid for survivors of Hurricane Katrina and the Indonesian tsunami. We provided funds for scholarships through Project 10's models of excellence program and camperships to children living with HIV and AIDS through Camp Laurel. And for charities in Israel putting food on the table for those in need through the Clare Hammer Chicken Fund and closer to home Mazon, Project Chicken Soup, and Food on Foot.

We've supported a wide range of cultural enrichment opportunities for children from economically depressed communities, enabling kids to attend a school trip to the zoo through Zoo Pals or through Sweet Strings making it possible for child to have a musical instrument on loan to take home during the school year.

And then there were the awful statewide California propositions — we gave to No on Knight and No on Prop 8 through Jews for Marriage Equality and Equality California.

And the list of charities goes on and on. Our community tzedakah is made possible because of the generosity and collective coin donations given anonymously by so many BCC members, their family and friends. Our little purple pushke has served us well. Over the years we've gone through 1500 of them, their purchase financed by a combination of donations from Tzedakah Council committee members, a handful of donors, and contributions from the Rabbi's and Cantor's discretionary funds.

New and different BCC pushkes are in the works. Our goal is to have then available for distribution by Chanukah. Here's the rub. Unlike past years at Rosh Hashanah we will not have pushkes to hand out for collecting your spare change and converting it to tzedakah. What to do? If you currently have a purple pushke with whatever change is inside, please return it when attending BCC High Holiday services at Temple Isaiah. No pushke, no problem. Here are alternative ways you can participate in making a contribution to BCC's community giving of tzedakah: put your loose change in a sack, jar or whatever and drop it off in the shul office; make a contribution with a credit card or write a check payable to BCC designating it for the tzedakah fund. Collectively we have and with your help will continue making a difference in touching people's lives.

New Beginnings for Ohr Chayim

It has always seemed natural to me that the Jewish New Year coincides with the beginning of school. I associate fresh notebooks and pencils and new clothes with crisp autumn leaves, apples and honey and eating in the Sukkah. Even in July I find myself saying "next year" when referring to anything that is happening in the

school year that starts only two months later. Just as in Elul we start to prepare for Rosh Hashanah, in August I am preparing for school. As a teacher and a program director, I appreciate the opportunity to start fresh with a clean slate. This experience has given me a new appreciation for Tashlich and the opportunity to cast the "uh-oh's" and the "oops's" into the flowing water.

This summer I have worked hard to learn from the mistakes and the successes of our experience with Ohr Chayim so far. The new Ohr Chayim calendar brings with it some new sweet beginnings for us. We welcome two new teachers to our staff: Shari Charamblous and Lihi Raviv. Both women are not only eager to work with our students and families, but proud to have joined this community. Shari, who is also known as Ms. Purple to her students, joins us after nine years working as a librarian at Akiba Sinai. Her enthusiasm for Jewish literature is infectious and already affecting our curriculum for this year. Lihi is an Israeli woman who has spent a good amount of time working in NYC (always a good place to come from) and lives down the street from BCC. She lights up when we talk about ways to engage children in learning Hebrew.

Juval Porat, our new cantor, will be working with Ohr Chayim families once a month. He will facilitate group singing, choral singing and learning that relates to the texts of the songs. With his help and guidance, our services and group times will be energized with singing and music. Lindy Davidson, our new Rabbinic Intern, and llene Cohen will be piloting a new class for BCC families with young children. On four planned occasions, they will facilitate a Shabbat program that brings parents and children together for storytelling, fingerplays, singing, eating and schmoozing.

We are also launching a new Family Havurah that will plan one activity a month for BCC families of all ages. Some of the activities include a visit to Noah's Ark at the Skirball and a beach clean up with Heal-the-Bay.

Of course the sweetest part of our new year will be

welcoming the new students and students returning in new roles. The recent Bat Mitzvah Eve Blum-Postrel will join the Ohr Chayim teaching staff as an assistant this year. How exciting for us!

As long as I am highlighting all the exciting beginnings at BCC, I feel I must include something not quite as new. Last spring we launched a new tutoring program. Three BCC members, Estaire Press, Steve Hochstadt and Ziva Renan, agreed to assist some of our older Ohr Chayim students once a week with Hebrew. The students and the teachers find 15-20 minutes a week to practice Hebrew reading. This arrangement has provided additional Hebrew reading practice time to our students, and the results have been terrific. With additional practice and encouragement, our older students have progressed beautifully.

Last, but not least, I am very excited about coordinating with Rabbi Lisa and with the ritual committee to integrate family and congregational planning for Sukkot, Chanukah, Purim and a special Shabbat in April. On those dates we will plan ways that we can bring the entire congregation together that honor the needs of families with young children while maintaining the BCC experience that all enjoy.
