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A Day With the Sofer Brings Gifts Both To and From Our Holocaust Torah

"The Torah is sick," said three-year-old Eliana, "and we made it feel better."

liana was one of more than 100 members and friends of BCC who, with the help of visiting Sofer (Torah scribe)

Neil Yerman, each reinscribed a letter in our Holocaust Torah at a special event on Sunday, March 20. (To find out more about the history of the Torah scroll itself, see the March-April 2005 issue of G'vanim.)

Five groups of about 20 each flowed through the sanctuary in the course of the day. The Sofer conducted an inspirational study session and prayers for each group before they joined him one by one on the bima. Taking an ink-dipped feather quill in their own hand, each person wrote a letter in the Yom Kippur portion of BCC's scroll, which dates from the 19th century and survived the Holocaust.

Participants came with a seriousness of purpose, with quiet reverence and intentionality. Sofer Neil was quick to address their most common concerns. Everyone's biggest fear, he explained, is that they might make a mistake in the writing of their letter. He reassured us that this simply could not happen, as his own hand would be gently but firmly guiding ours. He instructed us to relax, to breathe and to focus on being as fully present as possible to the sacred task we were about to perform—so that we would be able to feel the hand of the Torah's original scribe reaching out to us across time.

Eliana had been playing on the floor with a toy dinosaur while the Sofer spoke to her group. But when she went up to the bima with one of her

mothers, Robin Berkovitz, she turned her full attention to the Torah scroll. Accepting a ride on the "elevator" of the Sofer's knee, she—like her mother a few moments earlier—also took a turn holding the white quill between her small fingers and writing a letter.

"It was an awesome experience for my daughter and me to help keep alive the ancient words of this Holocaust Torah and the memories of those who created it," said Robin afterwards. "And we'll continue to breathe life into this Torah, unraveling the scroll and intoning its ancient words in services to come."

Sofer Neil was still a child himself when he first fell in love with letters. He relished practicing penmanship in school but did not enter formal training to become a scribe until his 30s. Today he heads a busy studio in New York City and travels frequently, sharing his skills and insights with congregations around the country.

Before beginning each day's work, Neil meditates and dons what looks like a purple artist's smock but is actually a kind of tallis. The color purple drew smiles from some of us, who

thought perhaps he wore it as a special touch for BCC! But we soon learned that the color and design are based on descriptions of certain priestly vestments in the Torah, and that this particular one was made in Israel about 10 years ago. ("It used to fit me better!" Neil joked, patting his stomach.)

A couple of years ago, longtime BCC member Jeffrey Weinstein took on the task of seeing to the repair of our Torah scrolls, and he initiated the current effort to bring attention again to our Holocaust scroll. "For me," said Jeffrey after the event was over, "Neil's most memorable point was the connection that Torah makes between Jews today and Jews throughout the ages."

Jeffrey and a core group of volunteers, along with Rabbi Lisa Edwards, were on hand throughout the day.

"It was Jeffrey Weinstein who made this day happen," said Rabbi Edwards. "He had a passion about what this day could be that I didn't quite have myself until I began watching the faces of the people taking that quill into their hands. I watched each and every person that day, and afterwards I was so incredibly grateful to Jeffrey and to our Sofer for the gentle way they guided our congregation to and through this experience."

Reflecting on his session with the Sofer, BCC vice-president Eldon Teper said, "I appreciated what Neil said about all your departed friends and relatives being with you as

you wrote your letter in the Torah. I felt the presence of my departed loved ones with me as I stood before the Torah helping to restore the parsha."

"This day of Torah ranks right near the tippy-top of my list of memorable moments I associate with BCC." exclaimed member Robin Baltic. "From beginning to end it was jampacked with heartfelt meaning. The Sofer was a brilliant and sweet man. He set the stage wonderfully for each us to reinscribe a letter in our Torah and to witness others do the same. Tears just streamed down my face watching Pam Postrel, Mindy Blum and their son Matt help to repair something others believed they could destroy."

"I have often read from the Torah," commented member Jeff Bernhardt, "but writing a letter in the Torah filled me with awe and anxiety. I wrote two 'yuds' (which spell God's name) in the middle of the word 'Chayim' (life). I was still shaking inside and out as I took in what I had been a part of. What a moving and spiritual experience."

"My letter was an 'S'," said BCC member Sylvia Weisenberg who came with her mother Renée. "And my mother's was an 'R'! We decided to come here together to write in the Torah because it seemed like such a unique opportunity. We thought only men who were trained as scribes were allowed to do that."

special," Allison Diamant said. "Scribing a word was spiritually uplifting for me, and made me think of Moses on Mt. Sinai. The intensity of the experience was similar to when I first carried the Torah and later when I first read from the Torah, at BCC's Yom Kippur services."

"All the children seemed mesmerized as they started to write," observed BCC president Davi Cheng. "The focus and concentration on their little faces were so intense, like grown-ups. For adults, on the other hand, I saw faces light up with smiles and excitement, becoming like little children!"

Sunday's sessions with the Sofer were preceded by a special Friday night service on March 18, featuring guest speaker Susan Boyer, co-founder of the Czech Torah Network and newlyappointed U.S. Director of the Londonbased Memorial Scrolls Trust, BCC board member Stephen Sass gave a dazzling drash on the week's Torah portion [read it at www.bcc-la.org] and also told the dramatic story of locating and contacting a survivor from the Czech town of Chotebor, the same community that our Holocaust Torah comes from. Olga Grilli (born Gabanyiova), now 76 years old and living in New Jersey and Florida, owes her survival to a 1939 Kindertransport to England made possible by a "Righteous Gentile" who has since been recognized for his actions in rescuing some 600 Czech Jewish children.

At that same Shabbat service, BCC member Cate Whiting received a blessing from the congregation as she publicly embraced the covenant, holding our Holocaust Torah in her arms.

Many years ago, longtime member Sue Terry herself embraced the covenant while holding this same Torah scroll. "I still think of it as 'my' Torah," she says warmly. "It was the first Torah I ever held in my life $-\alpha$ powerful moment."


Pride Shabbat is June 10!







President's Message

emember our post-election town hall meeting in November? People were ready for action, and among the many great ideas suggested was one about outreach to African American, Latino and other communities, to cultivate face-to-face partnerships. I want to share with you an experience I had that showed me the importance of such outreach. In February, Bracha and I flew to San Francisco to attend an invitation-only Think Tank for multicultural Jews from all over the world called Be'chol Lashon. "In Every Tongue." This is my third year being invited back to this conference, and for the first time. Bracha was invited to attend and was recognized as my spouse. This was a milestone.

The participants consisted of 80 plus incredible Jews from all walks of life and all movements of Judaism. We do not always agree with one another and many have never interacted with LGBT people face to face. Bracha and I were the only openly gay couple in the group. Ultra-orthodox Yemenite rabbis from New York had trouble looking at us after they found out who we were. There were Presidents and Directors from various national Jewish organizations and foundations, award winning journalists, filmmakers, scholars, and philanthropists. Some were from India, Mexico, China, Spain, Portugal, Zimbabwe, and other countries of Africa. There was a Tutsi Jew in exile from Rwanda and a scholar in the process of setting up a counsel of 100 rabbis and Imams to have dialogues at the United Nations.

Be'chol Lashon's goal is to work with diverse Jewish community leaders to promote visibility and produce information that will help our Jewish communities world-wide to be more racially, ethnically, and culturally inclusive. Initially, I was invited to

participate because of being Chinese and Jewish; little did I know that being a lesbian belonging to the world's first gay and lesbian synagogue would become an added bonus to this culturally diverse group. Three years ago, a couple of African American spiritual leaders said that homosexuals are sinful and that gays have no right to daven. This year, they thanked Bracha and me for being who we are and said that our presence enabled them to change the way they view gays and lesbians. Not only did they hope that one day we can be legally married, they wanted to have their pictures taken with us. What I found most humorous was that the San Francisco Chinese language TV station found me exotic too and interviewed me for prime time news. Try explaining Judaism in Cantonese!

Joking aside, I think it is important for each one of us to know, as I have learned, that because we are members of BCC, the world's first gay and lesbian synagogue, we automatically are ambassadors to the larger society. The changes I've seen in people's attitudes and viewpoints over this past three years have convinced me that BCC members have a very special purpose in the Jewish and GLBT communities.

By the way, on our last day of the conference, Bracha got in the elevator with one of the Yemenite rabbis. Not only did he look at her, he initiated a friendly conversation. Bracha and I were also approached by someone in an African American Jewish congregation who wanted to dialogue with us because of the experience our community has had dealing with HIV and AIDS. Maybe we can form a partnership with his community in the future to offer support and resources.

All of us individually can make a

difference and we can start by being pro-

active here at BCC. I want to acknowledge and celebrate with you BCC's accomplishments. At BCC, no tasks are too small. Everything that we do is with a purpose and importance. Greeting visitors before Shabbat services, getting DSL for the office, redesigning the website, fixing our leaky roof, or de-genderizing our bathrooms—everything that we do is to make BCC more open and welcoming for everyone.

Over the past few months the Board has been working on the issues of outreach, increasing our presence to outside communities, increasing membership, and branding. Howard Benenson, CEO of BenensonJanson marketing, has offered to guide us through the branding process. Check out their incredible work for organizations like the ACLU and APLA at www.benensonjanson.com.

And finally, the board renewed our rabbi's contract not for 3 years, not for 5 years, but until her retirement!

Classical Reform Service June 3 to Feature Isaacson Compositions

esach is over, yet I linger on the book we read during this season—the Song of Songs. Why is this book chosen to be read during Passover? Because it so eloquently expresses our personal relationship with the God who brought us forth from slavery.

In 1969, one of the most accomplished Jewish American composers, Dr. Michael Issacson, transformed the beautiful Song "Hegyon Libi" (The Meditations of my Heart) into music especially for

Shabbat. On June 3, thanks to a gift from longtime BCC member Jerry Nodiff, the BCC choir will present this work and others by Isaacson as part of a special musical Shabbat. Longtime BCC members may recall that eighteen years ago, then-Cantor Don Croll, BCC's Choir and a string quartet performed this same piece.

As the 1960s brought profound change to American music, the change in American Jewish music was no less dramatic. And because Reform Judaism is a movement that
responded to the
art forms surrounding it,
American Reform
Jewish music
drew from
musical theater,
anti-war music,
and atonal avant
guard music, all of
which influence
"Hegyon Libi."

With over 400 publications of secular and sacred music and 40 produced record-

ings and CDs, Issacson is one of the most accomplished Jewish American composers of our time.

The congregation is grateful to Jerry for giving BCC's choir and me the opportunity to offer an evening of Issacson's music set in the context of Classical Reform Judaism. BCC owes a great deal to the Reform Movement, and this evening will be a way to learn more about Reform Judaism as it was practiced over 30 years ago.

The Omer and Shavuot

Pasach has passed over and we are left counting the omer for 7 weeks,

marking the time after the Jews left Egypt and slavery but before they become a united people committed to G-d.

During the Exodus, the power of Adonai is proven through many miracles. Granted, the Jews were impressed enough to follow Moses out of Eygpt, but only a little time passes before they are whining about their state and even romanticizing their previous lives. It is during this time that Adonai provides water, food and healing, preparing the Jews to enter into the covenant. The midrash refers to G-d as a bridegroom who is courting his bride (the people Israel) trying to avoid appearing too hasty to wed.

Shavuot marks the moment when G-d gives the Jews the Torah and enters into a covenant with Israel. We receive Torah continually, but the text actually reads "gives" Torah. On this day, we are reminded that we were given Torah in an open desert, not the promised land, and that anyone can choose the covenant (not just those born into the tribes), reminding us to welcome all strangers in our midst. The book of Ruth is also read during Shavuot to remind us that Jews can enter the covenant through choice.

Torah was given on the mountain to remind us of the importance of our humility toward G-d. To observe this holiday at BCC, we will study late into the night of June 12th, once again receiving the gift of Torah. (See p. 5.)
